Millions of people around the world play golf. Golf courses come in many sizes and shapes. A standard course has 18 holes with fairways that can be up to 500 metres long. You hit a golf ball starting from a tee . You must continue playing the ball from wherever it lands. If it lands in a hazard and you cannot play it any more you are allowed to take it out and put it on the course, but then you get an extra point as a penalty.

The green is the round area at the end of the fairway. It has very short grass with a hole in the middle. There is a flag so that you can see where it is.

There are many different clubs that golfers use to play golf. Woods are used to hit the ball over long distances and irons are used for shorter shots, when you need to play more accurately. When the ball lands on the green you use a special club called putter to hit the ball into the hole.

Every hole has a certain number of strokes that a good golfer needs to place the ball into it. This is called par. You score a birdie if you need one stroke less than par. A bogie is one stroke over par.

In order to play with better players there is a handicap system that gives weaker players more strokes to finish a round.

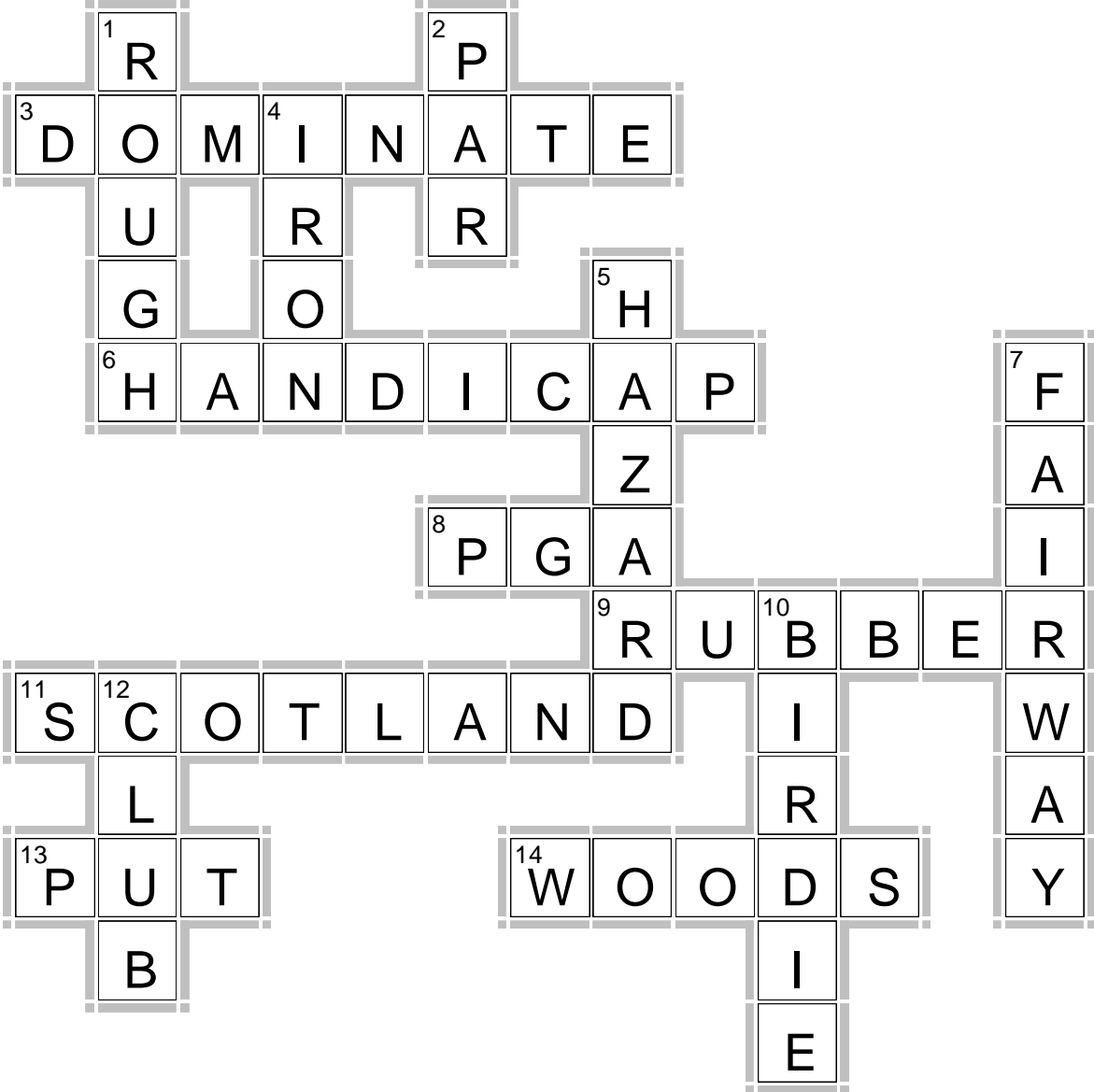
